Election Results Please Members

Thanks in no small part to the efforts of NJEA members like yourself, the New Year is sure to usher in change for teachers and education support professionals here in New Jersey.

As I am sure you are aware, Governor Elect Phil Murphy defeated Lieutenant Governor Kim Guadagno by 14 percentage points, garnering 282,938 more votes. It was an amazing victory.

In the 12th District, NJEA endorsed Republican Assemblyman Ronald Dancer and Robert Clifton were also successful in their bids for reelection. Unfortunately, our endorsed candidate for State Senate, Democrat David Lande, could not successfully unseat long time Senator Samuel Thompson.

In the 13th District, results were also mixed as was our endorsement. Democratic candidate Sean Byrnes was unsuccessful in his bid for State Senate against our long time foe, Senator Declan O'Scanlon. Results for the two open assembly seats were also mixed. Our endorsed Republican candidate Serena DiMaso was successful in her bid, while our endorsed Democratic candidate Tom Giaimo was not.

After years of pushing an anti-teacher agenda for our soon to be former Governor, Jen Beck was finally unseated in the 11th District by NJEA endorsed Democratic candidate Vin Gopal. He defeated incumbent Senator Jen Beck by over 3000 votes. It was an amazing victory.

Also in the 11th District, NJEA endorsed Assemblywoman Joann Downey and Assemblyman Eric Houghtaling, successfully defended their seats, and we look forward to continuing our work with them.

Down in South Jersey's 3rd District, members weren't so lucky. Despite the tremendous efforts of our members, NJEA endorsed Republican candidate Fran Grenier could not unseat incumbent Senate Speaker Steve Sweeney.

On behalf of Leadership and our Members, I would like thank everyone who volunteered on this race and other races throughout the state. These victories could not have happened without you and we should all be proud of what was accomplished.

New Governor Speaks at NJEA Convention

The new school year is well underway and we have been busy in the classroom and in our advocacy for public education, our students, and our members. Monmouth County Education Association members, along with NJEA members from around the state, worked tirelessly to get our endorsed candidates elected.

At our Fall Focus event in September and at our LAT meetings, we wrote countless postcards with personal notes to other members, we addressed reminder cards to our members to vote, and we made phone calls. Statewide our members logged over 30,000 phone calls. Throughout the state, 77% of all NJEA endorsed candidates won their elections.

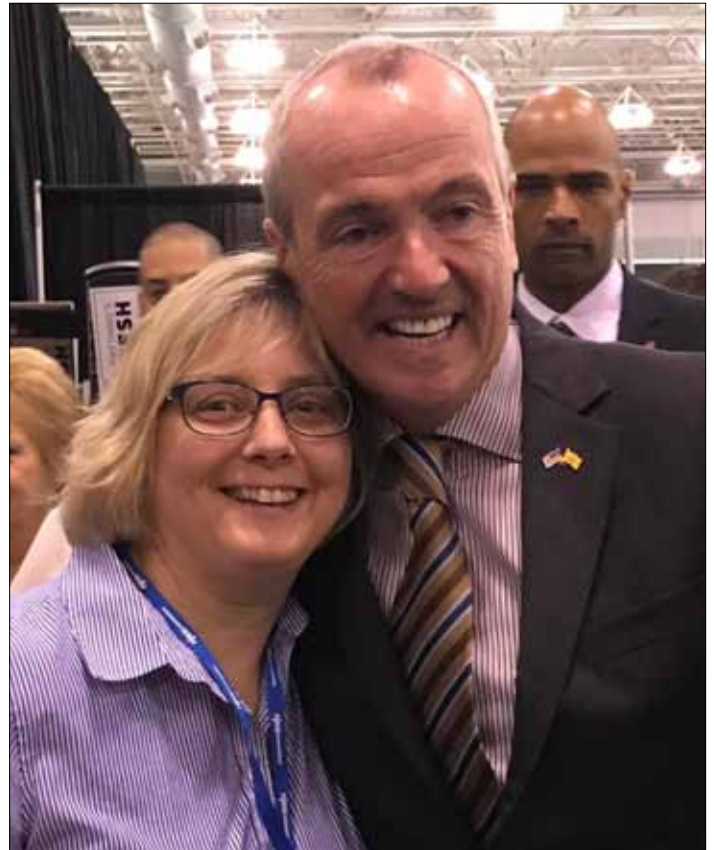
The excitement of the election was apparent as NJEA members from across the state converged on Atlantic City on the Thursday and Friday following Election Day. This year we were celebrating the election of Ambassador Phil Murphy as New Jersey's next governor. As promised at last year's convention, Ambassador Murphy addressed the crowds at convention. He thanked NJEA members for their support and hard work in helping him to get elected. He reaffirmed his commitment to support public education and the full funding of our pensions.

The main reason members attend the convention is to take advantage of the best professional learning available and countless opportunities to connect and collaborate with colleagues. The theme of the 2017 NJEA Convention was social justice, education justice, and student success. This theme was apparent throughout convention and at the plenary sessions. Ilyasah Shabazz, author, activist and educator, participated in a discussion with the three NJEA officers about her family's history of activism and the role educators can play. She also moderated a panel of six students from diverse backgrounds on their suggestions for creating more inclusive, considerate and effective learning environments. Shabazz, the daughter of Malcolm X and Dr. Betty Shabazz, urged the audience to consider that "activism is a way everyone should live their lives."

Friday's session by Mike Kuczala, the Director of Instruction for the Regional Training Center, and educational consulting firm based in Randolph, and president of Kuczala Consulting, had participants on their feet, working with partners and actively trying to keep a balloon in the air at one point. His classroom-friendly techniques engage students' minds and bodies. "Learn-

ing doesn't just happen from the brain up, it happens from the feet up," Kuczala said. He pointed out that physically fit students do better academically and he shared statistics about the health crisis that is building in the United States and the rise in diabetes among all children, but impacting the lives of African-American and Latino children the most. If you are looking to implement movement into your classroom, pick up the book *The Kinesthetic Classroom: Teaching and Learning Through Movement and Training In Motion: How to Use Movement to Create Engaging and Effective Learning*. Mike Kuczala is the coauthor of the book.

Attending the convention and electing Ambassador Murphy were definitely highlights of the fall, but I am sure that I'm not the only one counting the days until winter break. I hope everyone has the opportunity to relax, recharge, and refocus. I'm looking forward to the New Year and the next four years when we will have a Governor who supports us, our families, and public education. Happy New Year everyone!
